GROWING UP TO BE LIKE JESUS

READ THE ARTICLE

Cathryn and I remember fondly the days when our two kids were newborns and we brought them home from the hospital. Each was truly a bundle of joy. There is nothing like an angel-faced baby to touch a parent's heart deeply.

Like all parents, we expected our kids to grow up and not to remain infants. Over the years, we noticed slow and gradual changes in our children. Only when we look through old family photos do we realize how much they have grown up and, I must admit, how much we have changed, too.

What is true physically is also true spiritually. God expects His children, born into His family by faith in Jesus Christ, to grow up. Frankly, we are much like babies when we are first born again. The apostle Peter acknowledges this state of spiritual infancy when he encourages believers to, "like newborn infants, long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up into salvation" (1 Peter 2:2). The writer of Hebrews also encourages us to "leave the elementary doctrine of Christ and go on to maturity" (6:1).

Growing up to be like Jesus is more than mere childhood development, although that is not a bad place to start in our thinking. The Bible gives us glimpses into the early years of Jesus from His life in Bethlehem and Nazareth. For example, Luke 2:52 says of Him as a boy, "And Jesus increased in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and man." At the very least, this verse describes a young Jesus that developed intellectually, physically, spiritually, and socially. He was balanced in mind, body, soul, and spirit. Parents do well to follow this pattern in rearing their own children. However, growing up to be like Jesus through the process of discipleship involves so much more.

Jesus commissioned His followers to “go and make disciples of all nations” (Matthew 28:19-20). However, many believers, let alone the churches they attend, do not have a clear plan for how to implement this command. What is a disciple, anyway?

A disciple is first and foremost a learner that follows a leader or teacher. *The Baker Encyclopedia of the Bible* defines a disciple as “someone who follows another person or another way of life and who submits himself to the discipline (teaching) of that leader or way.” It goes on to make the point, “Wherever there is a teacher and those taught, the idea of discipleship is present.”¹

A disciple is a learner with the goal of also becoming a leader, one who eventually leads others to follow Jesus, a disciple that multiplies by making more disciples. The apostle Paul certainly had multiplication in mind when he urged the Corinthians to follow his example as he followed Christ’s. He also urged Timothy, “What you have heard from me in the presence of many witnesses entrust to faithful men, who will be able to teach others also” (1 Corinthians 11:1; 2 Timothy 2:2).

Age and maturity are not the same. Being born into the family of God by faith in Jesus Christ does not guarantee that anyone will advance into spiritual maturity. The Bible does say “he who began a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ” (Philippians 1:6). However, how much of that work God completes in this life depends on our cooperation with the Holy Spirit in sanctifying us, and on how willing we are to follow Jesus fully. This is why some children of God advance in maturity and, sadly, others remain in spiritual diapers.

Jesus was not afraid to set high standards for His followers. He expected His disciples to prioritize Him over the members of their own family, give up everything, and be willing to carry their own cross. Or, He said pointedly, you “cannot be my disciple” (Luke 14:25-33). He compared following Him to building a tower. “Won’t you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it?” The answer to Jesus’s rhetorical question is obviously yes. The clear implication is that while salvation is free of charge, discipleship comes at a mighty high cost. That’s why some people stopped following Jesus and others said, “Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life” (John 6:68).

Discipleship is active not passive spirituality, a life marked by personal sacrifice, self-denial, and surrendering to the will of God. It requires a daily and determined decision to follow hard after Jesus, fueled by a deep desire to know Him and be like Him. Disciples must also walk in the Spirit and resist the daily distractions of the world, the flesh, and the devil.

Needless to say, following Jesus is not for spiritual wimps. But the life Jesus lays out for us is the most exhilarating and exciting we can ever imagine. So, are you ready to grow up to be like Jesus? Grab your cross and let's follow Him.

WHAT IS THE GOSPEL?

READ THE ARTICLE

“Extra! Extra! Read all about it!”

A generation ago, news arrived slowly via daily newspapers, radio, and half-hour nightly news broadcasts aired by only three television networks. Then came the era of 24-hour cable news, followed by social media and other digital platforms delivering news at the speed of one’s fingertips. *Tweet* and *text* are new words in our vocabulary, and now everyone is a journalist with an opinion! These days, we can find out what is happening in the world anytime and anywhere. But these days, most news is bad news, and it weighs heavily upon us.

By contrast, the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ is always good news. It always has been and always will be good news. By itself, that is good news in an increasingly dark and despairing world. However, the gospel is good news for reasons you might not be aware.

The word *gospel* means “good news” and appears nearly one hundred times in the New Testament, translated from the Greek word *euangelion*, from which we get our English words *evangelist*, *evangel*, and *evangelical*. The gospel is refreshingly good news in a world full of toxic, unrelenting bad news. But it is also good news in light of the bad news about us found in the pages of Scripture. The Bible says “all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God” and that “the wages of sin is death” (Romans 3:23, 6:23a). Furthermore, “the heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked; who can understand it?” (Jeremiah 17:9).

The biblical diagnosis of the human heart and, thus, our spiritual condition is not good. Reading the Bible with any measure of honesty is like receiving news from an oncologist that we have stage four cancer. However, we are not sick and in need of self-

help medication; we are sinners – “dead in your trespasses and sins” (Ephesians 2:1) – and in need of a Savior who can resurrect us to new life.

Thankfully, God did not leave us without a remedy for our sins. Having planned our redemption before the foundation of the world and out of His great love for us, God sent His one and only Son, Jesus, to purchase our salvation through His death on the cross so that we would not perish but have eternal life (John 3:16; Romans 6:23b). The facts of the gospel are indisputable. In his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul writes, “For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures” (1 Corinthians 15:3-4).

The impact of the gospel on our lives individually and upon the world globally is unmatched. The apostle Paul declared, “For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek” (Romans 1:16). That means the gospel is a *bold* message in which we have confidence, a *powerful* message because it is God’s, and a *saving* message because it is the only one that can rescue us from the penalty of sin and truly transform the human heart. The gospel is also a *universal* message because it is available to all who believe and a *unifying* message because it brings together otherwise hostile ethnicities.

Every generation must fight for the purity of the gospel. Jude says we must “contend for the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints.” He warns that some people creep into the church to pervert the grace of God and deny the Lord Jesus Christ. For this reason, the church must always stand ready to defend the gospel like a heavyweight champion contenting for another boxing title. Though the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ is at least two thousand years old, and allusions to it date back to the third chapter of Genesis, there is no guarantee, humanly speaking, that the gospel will survive to the next generation.

A period of time in church history known as the Dark Ages proves this. Therefore, the church must believe the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. Furthermore, we must proclaim, protect, and live the gospel in our daily lives. As disciples of Jesus, carefully transferring the stewardship of the gospel to the next generation is also our

responsibility, while remembering that Jesus said, “I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it” (Matthew 16:18).

The gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ is enough to save us from the penalty, power, and presence of sin. It makes me want to shout, *“Extra! Extra! Read all about it! Read, believe, and respond by faith to the gospel today.*

THE ASSURANCE OF YOUR SALVATION

READ THE ARTICLE

Unilever is an Australian consumer products company that makes a deodorant and antiperspirant called Sure. During the 1980s, they advertised their product by showing images of confident people raising their hand high into the air, including a student asking a question, a bridesmaid catching a bouquet, and a policewoman directing traffic. The snappy ad jingle closed by saying, “Confident, confident, dry and secure. Raise your hand, raise your hand if you're sure!”

As a believer in Jesus Christ, you can and should be able to raise your hand with confidence that you are sure of your salvation. The apostle John says assuredly, “I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, that you may know that you have eternal life” (1 John 5:13). As a belief system, Christianity teaches there are some things we can know for sure.

Philosophy, on the other hand, begins with the basic assumption that we cannot know anything for sure. Socrates famously said, “The only thing I know is that I know nothing.” However, this is where human philosophy and biblical truth part ways. Colossians 2:8 warns, “See to it that no one takes you captive by philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the world, and not according to Christ.”

Philosophy is right about one thing. We cannot know anything unless someone or something with knowledge reveals truth to us. That’s exactly what the Bible says God has most certainly done in creation, in our conscience, through His written Word, and in the Living Word who is Jesus Christ. For that reason, we can raise our hand and be sure of so much, including that we possess eternal life through faith in Jesus.

Theologically, the assurance of our salvation flows out of the doctrine of eternal security, which points to the Holy Spirit's role in securing our salvation. The Holy Spirit is God's unbreakable seal on His people (Ephesians 4:30). The presence of the Holy Spirit in us from the moment of saving faith is also God's guarantee of our spiritual inheritance (Ephesians 1:13-14; 2 Corinthians 1:21-22). Think of the Spirit as like an earnest money deposit in a real estate transaction. The buyer's indication of good faith is the deposit he gives to the seller. He is saying, "I am good for the rest of the purchase price at closing." In the same way, the Holy Spirit is the first installment of the salvation inheritance God promises to give us in Christ.

A Trinitarian view of salvation helps to understand our assurance (Ephesians 1:3-14). God the Father planned our salvation, God the Son purchased our salvation, and God the Holy Spirit promises, secures, seals, and guarantees our salvation. Salvation is all about what God has done for us by His own gracious action. Because God is the One who guarantees our salvation by His Spirit, we should never doubt that He has saved us (1 Peter 1:4-5).

Why is the assurance of our salvation so important? Generally speaking, psychologists tell us that insecure people develop unhealthy relationships. They are self-obsessed and present false exteriors. They put other people down to make themselves feel good. I could go on but I think you get the idea.

Likewise, insecure Christians have a difficult time accepting the fullness of God's grace and forgiveness. Because they worry they might lose their salvation, they are always seeking God's approval rather than embracing the righteousness of Christ applied to them by faith. They often feel more rejected than redeemed, and certainly not pleasing in the eyes of God. An insecure believer may feel unworthy to come boldly before the throne of grace in prayer for help in time of need. Eternal insecurity can also lead to legalism, the measuring of one's spirituality by a list of arbitrary externals and the placing of those demands on others in the body of Christ.

For all of these reasons and more, the assurance of your salvation is essential to your healthy growth and development in Christ. This is why the devil, the accuser of God's people, will do everything he can to cast doubt on what God has declared to be true about you in Christ.

The phrase “once saved, always saved” is not found anywhere in the Bible, but the concept certainly is. As a believer in Jesus Christ, therefore, remember this: Confident, confident, saved and secure. Raise your hand, raise your hand because you’re sure.

Out of that debate came something called **the sacramental view of baptism**. As a sacrament, baptism was viewed as a means of receiving God’s grace. The Bible teaches that baptism is a symbol not a sacrament and that God’s grace results from faith not something we do (Ephesians 2:8-9). Therefore, baptism is an **ordinance** of the church not a sacrament.

So, what happens to an infant or child that dies before he or she is old enough to make a faith decision? God receives that child into His presence.^v

GOING PUBLIC WITH YOUR FAITH

READ THE ARTICLE

When I was a seminary student, I took a class in pastoral ministries that included a one-day lecture and lab on the theology and practice of New Testament baptism. The lecture from the professor who was also a pastor suggested the following verbiage to use with a baptism candidate while enacting the ordinance.

Pastor: "Have you placed your faith in Jesus Christ alone for the forgiveness of your sins?"

Candidate: "Yes"

Pastor: "Based on your profession of faith in Jesus Christ, and in obedience to His divine command, I baptize you, my brother, in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Then place the candidate under the water while saying, "Buried with Christ unto death." Immediately raise the candidate up out of the water while saying, "Rise again to new life."

For the lab, we traveled to a local church, filled the baptistery with water, and practiced on our fellow students. Facilitating a baptism by full immersion is not as easy as it looks. It's one thing to bury the candidate by placing him under water; it's another thing to raise him from the dead without the pastor going under himself. Sprinkling candidates with water or pouring it over their head sounds a lot easier. But the Greek word *baptizo*, which means "to dip, sink, submerge or immerse," compels me to perform baptisms by full immersion.

The lecture and lab provided me with the opportunity to closely examine the sacred symbol that Jesus ordained for practice in the church. Since then, I have baptized hundreds of people in various places, including the church baptistery,

swimming pools, Jacuzzis, and the ocean. I have even traveled to Israel and baptized people in the Jordan River. What a joy! In the Christian faith, baptism is one of two practices ordained by Jesus Christ who Himself was baptized by John the Baptizer (Mark 1:9); the other ordinance is communion or the Lord's Supper.

Debate about the holy ordinance of baptism litters church history. The Catholic Church still views baptism as one of seven sacraments that confer God's grace. Protestants, of course, protest such theology, rejecting it on the basis that eternal salvation is a gift of God's grace and "not by works" (Ephesians 2:8-9; Titus 3:5-7), not even the work of baptism.

So what exactly is Christian baptism? First, baptism is a *symbol not a sacrament*. Like a wedding ring, baptism outwardly pictures an inward reality made possible by a pledge of faith or commitment. Baptism by immersion under water best pictures this spiritual reality and identifies us with the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ (Romans 6:4; Colossians 2:12).

Baptism does not accomplish our salvation any more than a wedding ring makes a single person married. Likewise, a person does not need to be baptized to be saved and go to heaven. Jesus assured the thief on the cross of paradise even though the thief was never baptized (Luke 23:39-43).

Second, baptism is an *act of obedience*. Jesus mandated baptism in the Great Commission when He said, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them ..." (Matthew 28:19). This is a command not a suggestion. For this reason, baptism is a first step of obedience in the Christian life. Jesus said, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" (John 14:15). Have you been baptized?

Third, baptism is a *public profession of faith*; it is the way we say unashamedly, "I have decided to follow Jesus!" Therefore, baptism is a celebration and proclamation of one's faith in Jesus Christ. In the early church, it cost a disciple something, perhaps his or her own life, to publicly identify with Jesus Christ through baptism. Therefore, only true believers were baptized, but when they believed they were baptized immediately.

THE DISCIPLINES OF A DISCIPLE

READ THE ARTICLE

Like most young boys growing up in Indiana, I collected baseball cards and dreamed about one day playing for my favorite professional team. I remember cherishing a specialty card in my collection with a picture of one major league baseball player teaching others how to hit a baseball. The words “Ted Shows How” appeared across the top of the card. That’s “Ted” as in Ted Williams.

Ted Williams is still one of the best hitters the game of baseball has ever produced. Aspiring players marvel at his lifetime batting average of .344 and 521 home runs. To this day, he remains one of few players to hit .400 for a full single season, finishing at .406 to be exact. Williams literally wrote the book called *The Science of Hitting* after he retired from baseball and had time to think about why he was so successful.

People like Ted Williams know there is no such thing as an overnight success. The modern celebrity culture makes us think otherwise by confusing fame with the kind of achievement that only comes by hard work over a long period of time. Athletes, artists, musicians, businesspeople, and the like all know that it takes discipline and a long determination in the same direction to accomplish anything worthwhile in this life. The same is true in the Christian life. The sanctifying work of the Holy Spirit in making disciples of us requires a “long obedience in the same direction.”¹

I am not suggesting that we must work hard to achieve salvation and possess eternal life. On the contrary, we are not saved *by* good works but *for* good works (Ephesians 2:8-10). The Bible also says, “Work out your own salvation with fear and

trembling, for it is God who works in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure” (Philippians 2:12-13).

The working out of your salvation happens as you cooperate with the sanctifying grace of the Holy Spirit in what is also called discipleship. Work out your faith in the good times and in the bad times, when God feels close and when He seems far away. Work it out, knowing that God is also at work in you.

The journey is short from the word “disciple” to the word “discipline.” A disciple of Jesus Christ is a disciplined person. In fact, the apostle Paul encourages his young protégé in the ministry named Timothy by saying, “Discipline yourself for the purpose of godliness; for bodily discipline is only of little profit, but godliness is profitable for all things, since it holds promise for the present life and also for the life to come” (1 Timothy 4:7-8 NAS).

Like Ted Williams who showed others how to hit a baseball, Jesus shows us how to live the Christian life successfully by inviting us to follow Him and learn from Him (Matthew 4:19, 11:29). Today, I wish I still had that Ted Williams baseball card in my possession. Unfortunately, my mother sold my entire box of baseball cards in a garage sale when I was in college. I know, I know. Don't get me started. Fortunately, Jesus promised to always be with us even to the end of the age (Matthew 28:20).

MORE DISCIPLINES OF A DISCIPLE

READ THE ARTICLE

The list of spiritual disciplines we could talk about seems endless. For example, in his best-selling book *Celebration of Discipline*, Richard Foster lists no less than twelve spiritual disciplines we can and should practice. He categorizes them as inward, outward, and corporate disciplines. In the previous session, I offered a different way of thinking by listing the mind, body, heart, and soul as the first areas of life that require the kind of spiritual training that leads to godliness (1 Timothy 4:7-8). Other areas that require the same include our time, money, will, and relationships. How we discipline these last four areas of life is a worthy discussion.

Imagine someone depositing \$1,440 into your bank account every day. The catch is you must spend it at a rate of \$1 per minute or the money will transfer back out of your account. That's what time is like. Each day contains 24 hours or 1,440 minutes.

Time, of course, is a non-reusable resource. We cannot save time or store it in a retrieval system. As the old saying goes, we must use it or lose it. Truly, time is of the essence because we never get back the time we waste. According to the Bible, we can only redeem it (Ephesians 5:15-16). But what exactly is time?

The famous physicist Dr. Stephen Hawking wrote a book titled *A Brief History of Time*. Honestly, reading it left me still scratching my head about time. In my opinion, Dr. Stephen Olford, a pastor, offers the best definition of time and certainly one that is less scientific. He says, "Time is a fragment of eternity given by God to man as a solemn stewardship." In other words, time is a sacred trust for which we will give an account. Time is also a creation concept and the rhythm of life ordained by God (Genesis 1:3, Ecclesiastes 3:1).

We can spend a lot of time and money learning time management techniques. However, nothing motivates me to spend my time wisely more than the thought of one day standing before God and hearing Him ask, "What did you do with the time I gave you on earth?"

A conversation about the discipline of our time leads to the same about money because some people say time is money. As followers of Jesus, the most important question we must answer about money is this: Whose money is it, anyway? Jesus talked more about money than He did heaven and hell combined. He knew that money could easily become the god we worship. That's why He said point blank, "You cannot serve God and money" (Matthew 6:24). He also got to the heart of the money matter by saying, "Where your treasure is that's where your heart is also" (Matthew 6:21).

Transitioning our worldview of money and property from ownership to stewardship is not easy. The material things we possess in life threaten to possess us, and they die a slow death. They are some of the last things to come under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. Once we resolve the money matter and accept the fact that all we have belongs to God (Psalm 24:1), and that we are merely His money and property managers (Luke 16:1-14), then we can begin talking about the biblical way to discipline and manage the wealth God has entrusted to us.

Our will also requires discipline and must be brought under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. Jesus famously prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane, "My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will" (Matthew 26:39). Even Jesus, the sinless Son of God, learned obedience and submission to the Father's will through suffering (Hebrews 5:8).

Picture a wild stallion that runs freely in the open range but also has the potential to become a thoroughbred racehorse that wins the Kentucky Derby. Horse trainers talk about "breaking" such a horse. In other words, the horses' will must be brought into compliance with the rider's will. That's the only way he will become a champion. In the same way, God who redeemed us also sees great potential in us. But our wild and stubbornly sinful will must be broken and brought in submission to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. Only then will we glorify God and fulfill the purpose for which He created us.

Finally, our relationships require healthy discipline. We were created for community, hard-wired for connection in human relationships. That shouldn't surprise us because perfect fellowship exists in the triune Godhead between the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Also, more than 50 "one another" passages in the New Testament bears witness to the fact that we need each other, whether we are willing to admit it or not. The best place for us to experience authentic, biblical community is in the church, a body of assembled believers in Jesus who, like a family, brings comfort to people in a harsh and sinful world (Acts 2:42-47).

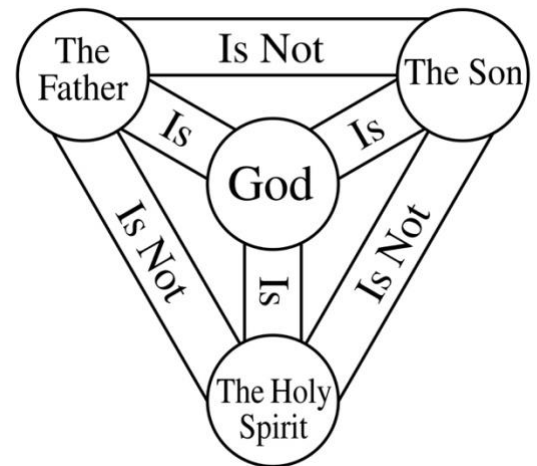

THE HOLY SPIRIT IN YOU

READ THE ARTICLE

I Am Third is the title of a famous sports autobiography written by Gale Sayers, a first-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears and one of the greatest running backs to ever play the game of football. Sayers set numerous NFL records and was easily inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Gale Sayers always insisted, “God is first, others are second, and I am third.”

The Holy Spirit is often thought of as the third member of the Godhead after God the Father and God the Son. Frankly, the Holy Spirit would be just fine saying, “I am third” because His role is to point others to Jesus and bring glory to the Father. For that reason, He could also be called the shy member of the Holy Trinity.

For some, the Holy Spirit is a tad spooky because He is also called the Holy *Ghost*. I have actually heard some people who are unfamiliar with the Spirit’s ministry laugh sheepishly and say, “He’s sort of like Casper the Friendly Ghost, right?” For others, the Holy Spirit represents extremes in Christian theology that they would rather avoid. For many others that attend church regularly, the Holy Spirit is simply the forgotten member of the Trinity. He is a distant third in their understanding of one God who reveals Himself in three distinct persons and personalities.

Before the Holy Spirit came on the day of Pentecost, Jesus gave hints about His future ministry in the church, describing the Spirit in ways that might make institutional Christianity cringe a bit. The Holy Spirit is closer than the air we breathe (John 20:22), as mysterious as the wind (John 3:6-8), and like a stream of living water (John 7:37-39).

Consider the Spirit of God as a stream of living water and then picture a water log ride at the amusement park, or a white water rafting trip down the Snake River. Picture anything but a boring ride through life so many people have sadly come to accept as

normal in the Christian life. As a stream of living water, the Holy Spirit is like a gentle brook one minute and like a rush of white-capped holy water the next. According to pastor and author Mark Batterson, Celtic Christians actually refer to the Holy Spirit as *An Geadh-Glas* or the “Wild Goose.”

It does not take long to discover how impossible it is to live the Christian life. I am not talking about the challenges of persecution from a world that is mostly hostile to the Christian faith. Rather, I am referring to the daily and personal struggle to live by a new standard, value system, and set of ethics which the Christian life demands. For that reason, and until you learn how to yield to and draw upon the Holy Spirit, the Christian life can lead to defeat, frustration, and real spiritual fatigue.

Let’s assume you are a new creation in Christ and that your desires have truly changed. For example, you really want to discard the bitterness in your heart and forgive, live a sexually pure life, and clean up what comes out of your mouth. But you have tried and failed more than once. You have decided that Christianity is just too hard to live. Honestly, you are ready to throw in the towel and quit. Sound familiar?

In Romans chapter 7, the apostle Paul expressed his personal struggle to live the Christian life. “For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I keep on doing” (v. 19). Paul concludes, “Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!” (v. 24-25). Then comes Romans chapter 8 where Paul talks about the essential purpose and role of the Holy Spirit in the Christian life.

The same Jesus who invited you to follow Him also provided the resources to do so successfully. He promised and then sent the glorious and powerful Holy Spirit to enable you to live a victorious life with supernatural results. That and more is now possible because of the Holy Spirit in you.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Apostle Paul

A convert from Judaism (the religion of Israel), whom God used to write two-thirds of the New Testament.

Baptismal regeneration

The false teaching that states that a person must be baptized in order to receive salvation.

Bethlehem

The city in the nation of Israel where Jesus was born.

Born again

The term used to describe an individual's conversion to becoming a Jesus follower, a Christian.

Carnal

A term that means "of the flesh" and, when applied to a person, describes an immature believer in Jesus, a spiritual infant, and/or someone given over to human passions (1 Corinthians 3:1-3).

Corinthians

The term used to describe an individual who lives in the city of Corinth, located in Greece.

Day of Pentecost

Originally, a Jewish festival celebrated fifty days after Passover. In Christian observance, it is considered the birthday of the church.

Discipleship

The process of training (formally/informally) an individual goes through after becoming a Christian.

Disciple

An alternate term for a Christian, a believer in Jesus Christ. The actual word means a “learner.”

Eternal security

The teaching that once a person is genuinely saved (has confessed Jesus as their Savior), their salvation is secured such that salvation cannot be lost.

Fasting

The practice of denying yourself something (food typically) to pursue the spiritual discipline of prayer, time alone with God, meditation, etc.

Godliness

The word denotes that piety or behavior which is well pleasing to God.

Glorification

The final stage of salvation, concerning the resurrection of the body of the believer being raised in perfection and immortality at the second coming of Christ.

Holiness

The basic meaning is “to be set apart.” It signifies separation unto God, the resulting state of a person so separated by their conversion to Christ.

Illumination

The ongoing work of the Holy Spirit in the Christian person and community in assisting believers to interpret, understand, and obey the Scriptures.

Inspiration

A term used by many theologians to designate the work of the Holy Spirit in enabling the human authors of the Bible to record what God desired to have written in the Scriptures. The Greek word translated “inspired” in 2 Timothy 3:16, for example, literally means “God-breathed.”

Justification

The work and act of God to declare a sinner as righteous before Him due to the sacrificial work of Jesus on the cross and through His powerful resurrection from the dead.

Natural Person

In the Christian faith, this term is synonymous to an unbeliever.

Nazareth

The city in the nation of Israel where Jesus grew up.

New Testament

The last 27 books of the Bible, recognized by the Christian church containing everything necessary for faith and practice.

Ordinance

An alternate word for sacrament without the connotation of conveying grace but only representative as a symbol. The two primary ordinances in the church are baptism and the Lord's Supper.

Original sin

The sin of rebellion/disobedience committed by Adam & Eve passed down through the generations.

Propitiation

An offering made to God to appease or satisfy His wrath against mankind's sin. This offering was accomplished by Jesus's death on the cross.

Protestants

A branch of Christianity which separated from the Roman Catholic Church during the 1500's, due to disagreements about certain teachings and practices held by the church of that day.

Prayer

The term used for communicating/communing/fellowship with God.

Redemption

The supreme act of love by God, to provide man the only way to come back into a right relationship with Him, through the sacrificial death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, His Son, and our Savior.

Regeneration

A biblical term for referencing salvation of the individual who places their faith in Christ for salvation. It emphasizes the rebirth or re-creation of fallen human beings by the indwelling Holy Spirit.

Sacrament

When viewed within non-protestant churches, sacraments are understood as a means of conveying grace (God's unmerited favor) to the individual. Within Catholicism, the seven sacraments are Baptism, Confirmation or Chrismation, Eucharist, Penance, Anointing of the Sick, Holy Orders, and Matrimony.

Sanctify

To be set apart or make holy for the work of God.

Sanctification

The lifelong process where the Holy Spirit separates us from the world and separates us unto God through our "growing up" in a spiritual sense, which will show itself through our lifestyle pattern and choices.

Sexual immorality

It means "a surrendering of sexual purity," and is primarily used for premarital sexual relations. It involves any type of sexual expression outside the boundaries of a biblically defined marriage relationship (Matthew 19:4-5).

Sin

The term the Bible uses to describe falling short of keeping the standard of God's righteousness.

Spirit baptism

The work and ministry of the Holy Spirit at the moment of salvation to place (baptize) the believer in Jesus into the spiritual body of Christ here on earth.

Spiritual Person (I.e., a spiritual Christian)

Is a person who abides in Christ, has had their thinking shaped by the Word of God (Romans 12:2), allows the Spirit of God who lives inside them to guide them instead of them relying on natural wisdom and understanding as their sole source. In other words, a mature believer.

Stewardship

In basic terms, it conveys the meaning of "a manager of a household or an estate." Christians therefore, are stewards of all that God has given to them regarding time, talents, and financial resources.

Trinity

A description of the God of Christian Scripture revealed and understood as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; a fundamental doctrine of Christian theology.

Trinitarian

A person who believes in the biblical teaching that God exists as a triune being.

Timothy

A convert to Christianity who became Paul's disciple and later pastor of the church at Ephesus.

Water baptism

The outward symbol of an inward transformation (having become a Christian), following our Lord's example, our first or next step of obedience.

Worship

The act of adoring and praising God that is, ascribing worth to God as the one who deserves homage and service. There is both an individual and corporate aspect to this practice.

ⁱⁱ R.C. Sproul says, "What [the doctrine of eternal security] means is that once a person has become quickened by the Holy Spirit, born of the Spirit, and justified through faith in Christ and therefore placed in a state of salvation, that person will, in fact, never lose his salvation. That is a very controversial point within the context of historic Christianity."

ⁱⁱⁱ Some point to Hebrews 6:4-6 (along with 10:26-39) as evidence that a believer in Jesus can lose his or her salvation by "falling away." Keep in mind that the writer's purpose in the larger context is not to instill fear but to assure. Bible students have come up with several approaches to interpreting this passage. The best is to see the presentation of a hypothetical case that says, in effect, "Let's suppose that you do not go on to maturity. Does this mean that you will go back to condemnation, that you will lose your salvation? Impossible! If you *could* lose your salvation, it would be impossible to get it back again; and this would disgrace Jesus Christ. He would have to be crucified again for you, and this could never happen" (Wiersbe, *The Bible Exposition Commentary*, Vol. II, pp. 296-297). It is always best to interpret difficult Scripture in light of the plain and obvious. There are plenty of passages that plainly support the believer's eternal security, including Jude 24-25, Philippians 1:6, and others already mentioned.

^{iv} Baptism doesn't accomplish our salvation; it merely illustrates it. In other words, baptism doesn't make you a believer; it only shows that you have already believed. In that way, baptism is like a wedding ring. A wedding ring is an outward symbol of an inward commitment.

^v For further reading on this subject, read chapter 22 of Ron's book *Mysteries of the Afterlife: Exploring Its Amazing Secrets*, titled "Eternity for Those Who Cannot Believe."
